Combray (d'après le nom littéraire donné par Proust à son village d'enfance, Illiers, rebaptisé après sa mort Illiers-Combray) est un petit ensemble qui ouvre La Recherche du Temps Perdu. Le narrateur, adulte, songe aux différentes chambres où il a dormi au cours de sa vie, notamment celle de Combray, où il passait ses vacances lorsqu'il était enfant. Cette chambre se trouvait dans la maison de sa grand-tante : « La cousine de mon grand-père -- ma grand-tante -- chez qui nous habitons... » Le narrateur se remémore à quel point l'heure du coucher était une torture pour lui ; cela signifiait qu'il allait passer une nuit entière loin de sa mère, ce qui l'angoissait au plus haut point : « ...le

moment où il faudrait me mettre au lit, loin de ma mère et de ma grand-mère, ma chambre à coucher redevenait le point fixe et douloureux de mes préoccupations. » Pendant longtemps, il ne se souvint que de cet épisode de ses séjours dans la maison de sa grand-tante. Et puis, un jour, sa mère lui proposa une tasse de thé et des madeleines, qu'il refusa dans un premier temps puis finit par accepter. C'est alors que, des années après son enfance, le thé et les miettes du gâteau firent remonter toute la partie de sa vie passée à Combray : « ... et tout Combray et ses environs, tout cela qui prend forme et solidité, est sorti, ville et jardins, de ma tasse de thé. » Cette partie de la vie du narrateur n'était pas seulement marquée par le drame du coucher. Elle fut

l'occasion de s'éveiller aux sens (l'odeur des aubépines, la vue de la nature autour de Combray, lors de promenades familiales), à la lecture (les romans de Bergotte, auteur fictif qui d'ailleurs sera lui-même un personnage du roman) ; le narrateur se promène de part et d'autre de Combray avec sa famille : du côté de Méseglise, ou du côté de Guermantes si le temps le permet. Il adore sa mère et sa grand-mère, mais, plus globalement, sa famille apparaît comme un cocon dans lequel le narrateur enfant se sent heureux, protégé et choyé. Un amour de Swann est une parenthèse dans la vie du narrateur. Il y relate la grande passion qu'a éprouvée Charles Swann (qu'on a rencontré dans la première partie comme voisin et ami de la famille) pour une cocotte, Odette de Crécy. Dans

cette partie, on voit un Swann amoureux mais torturé par la jalousie et la méfiance vis-à-vis d'Odette. Les deux amants vivent chacun chez soi, et dès que Swann n'est plus avec son amie, il est rongé par l'inquiétude, se demande ce que fait Odette, si elle n'est pas en train de le tromper. Odette fréquente le salon des Verdurin, couple de riches bourgeois qui reçoivent tous les jours un cercle d'amis pour dîner, bavarder ou écouter de la musique. Dans un premier temps, Swann rejoint Odette dans ce milieu, mais au bout d'un moment, il a le malheur de ne plus plaire à madame Verdurin et se fait écarter des soirées organisées chez elle.

is a hybrid, a novel-essay, a capacious work of fiction containing a commonplace-book. It might, as Roland Barthes has suggested, be thought of as the product of profound and cherished indecision, Proust's indecision between two styles of writing, the moralistic and the fictive/novelistic/romanesque. Structure and Science is an exploration of this indecision. The shorter Proust, Proust the moraliste, is a prolific writer of maxims, from the laws of the passions to the aesthetic manifesto of the Temps retrouve to the [rapacious] teeming/fertile/spawning/exuberant/luxuriant reflection(s) on sexuality, politics, society.
