Sociological Imagination is widely regarded as one of the most influential works of post-war sociology. At its heart, the work is a closely reasoned argument about the nature and aims of sociology, one that sets out a manifesto and roadmap for the field. In critical thinking, reasoning involves the creation of an argument that is strong, balanced, and, of course, persuasive.
