The implications of such a

far-reaching, as much in

paramount importance in
this coincidentia
oppositorum is the
suggested possibility of a

correlation between the artistic use of chance and a system of thought itself organised around chance. Indeed placing randomness at the centre of one's art may have deeper philosophical consequences than just on the aesthetic level.

The Concept of Nature

Is all that exists part of the natural world? If there are non-natural entities,

what is their difference from natural things? Is the human-independent realm of nature the only paradigm for ontological respectability, as naturalism claims? Can existence be simply explained away by means of formal devices? Philosophers keep struggling with such questions. Still, the two basic notions involved, that of existence and that of nature, have not yet been fully explored. The four essays collected here address the issue from the points of view of the

philosophy of mathematics, of analytic ontology, of early modern philosophy, and of contemporary phenomenology. The results will surprise the reader: difficult topics are unlocked, long-received views are called into question, and new perspectives are opened.

Hailed as one of the most valuable books on the relation of philosophy and science, Alfred North Whitehead's *The Concept of Nature*, first published in 1920, was an important contribution to the development of philosophic naturalism. Examining the fundamental problems of

substance, space, and time, Whitehead assesses the impact of Einstein's theories as well as the then-recent findings of modern physics on the concept of nature. For students and teachers of natural philosophy, this is essential reading. English mathematician and philosopher ALFRED NORTH WHITEHEAD (1861-1947) contributed significantly to 20th-century logic and metaphysics. With Bertrand Russell he cowrote the landmark *Principia Mathematica*,

and also authored An Inquiry Concerning the Principles of Natural Knowledge, The Function of Reason, and Process and Reality.

The emergent “science” of transgenderism and related philosophies of gender propose a full-scale inversion of the understanding of God, man, and the created

order articulated in classical metaphysics, undermining and parodying both the causality and ontology voiced by Genesis 1:27 (“God created man in His own image, . . . male and female He created them”). Whether through subversive performative identity or by surgical sex change, the divinely made human person is now threatened with abolition and replacement by the self-made man and the man-made woman. In *Metaphysics and Gender*, Michele M. Schumacher

offers a corrective to this distorted and distorting outlook, calling for the recovery of an anthropological vision rooted in recognition of the normative divine “art” of nature and of the likeness—and far greater unlikeness—between divine and human causality. Surveying contemporary transgender trends, Schumacher identifies and excavates their conceptual and ideological foundations in the gender theory of Judith Butler, the

existentialist feminism of Simone de Beauvoir, and the atheistic existentialism of Jean-Paul Sartre. To the erroneous philosophical presuppositions of these thinkers Schumacher contrasts the metaphysically grounded thought of Aristotle and Thomas Aquinas, advancing their positive account of the good of creation and of the meaning of ethical norms, human freedom and natural inclinations, and embodiment, and mounting a timely and

trenchant defense of the divinely created human person.

De nombreuses recherches et discussions tout au long de la tradition philosophique, et particulièrement dans l'oeuvre de Thomas d'Aquin, ont pris pour theme le desir naturel de voir Dieu. Mais ce concept a souvent ete utilise sans en comprendre pleinement le sens dans l'oeuvre de l'Aquinate. A l'aide de la methode lexicographique appliquee

au lemme desiderium, la presente recherche s'attache a eclairer la notion de desir telle qu'elle a ete exprimee dans les textes de Thomas. Elle donne de comprendre le relief metaphysique qu'un tel concept y acquiert et de decouvrir qu'il assume une signification tres large.
