In 1844, Alexandre Dumas published *The Three Musketeers*, a novel so famous and still so popular today that it scarcely needs introduction. Shortly thereafter he wrote a sequel, *Twenty Years After*. Later, toward the end of his career, Dumas wrote *The Red Sphinx*, another direct sequel to *The Three Musketeers*

In addition, he provides photographic evidence of ancient sluice gate traces to demonstrate that, during the Old Kingdom, the Sphinx as Anubis sat surrounded by a moat filled with water--called Jackal Lake in the ancient Pyramid Texts--where religious ceremonies were held. He also provides evidence that the exact size and position of the Sphinx were geometrically determined in relation to

the pyramids of Cheops and Chephren and that it was part of a pharaonic resurrection cult.
